Interdisciplinary Education





CCIDS offers Maine's only nationally and internationally recognized undergraduate and graduate education in Interdisciplinary Disability Studies; Maine's only graduate study in early intervention, producing graduates that provide leadership in providing policy, services, and supports for young children with special needs and their families; and Maine's only Leadership Education in Neurodevelopmental and Related Disabilities (LEND) training program—a partnership with the Geisel School of Medicine at Dartmouth and the University of New Hampshire Institute on Disability.



Research, Evaluation and Policy Analysis





CCIDS contributes to and advances the knowledge base in a wide range of disability-related areas through ongoing research, evaluation, and the analysis of public policy. Recent initiatives include the areas of inclusive child care, literacy access for individuals with intellectual disabilities, universal design, autism, early childhood mental health and robotics. Sustainable Implementation of Family-Centered Transition Planning for Young Adults with Autism Spectrum Disorders


