



Leadership Education in Neurodevelopmental and Related Disabilities Traineeship Application

Applications are accepted on a rolling basis. Interviews for eligible candidates will be scheduled ***upon receipt of a complete application packet.***

Eligible candidates include:

1. **Graduate Students** in audiology, early childhood, special education, family studies, nursing, nutrition, occupational therapy, pediatrics, physical therapy, psychology, public health, social work, speech language pathology, or other related disciplines.
2. **Professionals** working in the community supporting children and youth (birth to 21 yrs) with neurodevelopmental disabilities and/or special health care needs and their families (i.e., early support and service providers, school administrators, general and special educators, related service professionals, and health care providers).
3. **Family members** of a child or youth with a disability and/or special health care needs.

Applicants must have earned a minimum of a bachelor's degree and be a citizen or non-citizen national of the United States or lawfully admitted for permanent residence.

*Long-term traineeships require a minimum commitment of **300 hours** over a 9-month period.*

Competitive scholarships are available to qualified applicants with funding provided by the Maternal and Child Health Bureau.
